Who we are

The UNESCO Institute for Statistics (UIS) is the official source of internationally comparable data on education, science, culture, and communication, which it produces by working with national statistical offices, line ministries, and other statistical organizations. The UIS Director serves as UNESCO's chief statistician.



The Institute was established by the decision of the 30th UNESCO General Conference in 1999. In 2001, the Institute moved to Montreal, following the invitation of the Canadian Government. UIS staff also work in UNESCO offices in Bangkok, Dakar, New Delhi, [Beirut, and Santiago].



The UIS is governed by its own Governing Board of 12 international experts, representing users and producers of statistics from different regions and international organizations.





Core Activities:

(unearmarked or earmarked for education funding) work within the UIS mandate, such as

- data collection,
- indicator production,
- · capacity development,
- data products dissemination,
- research and innovation.

Such activities span over many years and require consistent, long-term funding.



Projects:

(earmarked funding)

time-bound, output-specific activities which last 1 to 3 years.

They are not expected to continue after the planned output is delivered.
